THE LAST PIECE OF THE PUZZLE

Have you ever worked on one of those massive jigsaw puzzles? You know, the kind with 5,000 mind-numbingly tiny, odd-shaped, funny-looking pieces. Have you ever gotten to the end and come to the heart-breaking realization that, alas, after working and slaving over that puzzle for so long your back is now in the shape of a pretzel *one piece is missing?* You scream to the heavens for sanity, you turn the house upside down, you accuse family members of theft, you even check the “output” of the family dog days later to make sure that he didn’t eat it. How could you have known that this one little part would wind up causing the picture to be incomplete?

We tend to treat ourselves and our money the same way. We may be odd-shaped, funny-looking, and seem incredibly small in our own eyes. We think that there is no way

we could be of use for the Kingdom of Christ.

We do the same with our money. We think that what we have to give can’t fill the need, so why give it. There are plenty of people who would give “big checks” to the work of the Lord.

I want to take you to a story that is featured in all 4 Gospels. The Feeding of the 5,000. Could that many men and their families be out there for the whole day and no one thought to pack a lunch? Or was it that no one wanted to give what they had? Except for one little boy who was willing to share. Notice that it was a boy; someone who would be “the least of these” to give. He realized that he was no one of importance or stature, yet he was willing to be used.

Also, what he had to give was inadequate. In the

natural you cannot feed over 5,000 people with what he had.

The lessons here are simple. First, don’t minimize your importance to the Kingdom. You are the missing piece. There is a you-shaped spot in God’s grand design and it can’t be filled by anyone else. You are designed to connect with other pieces of the puzzle that no one else is. You are important.

Secondly, don’t treat your “little” offering to God as insignificant. God will multiply it as He sees fit. Too often we try to control our money after we have given it. What if that boy had done that with his lunch?

God sees the big picture. He knows how each part fits together. He knows what it is supposed to look like...after all, He is the artist!
